

# PSU President Spanier To Expand Extension

GRANTVILLE (Dauphin Co.) — Penn State University President Graham Spanier spoke to 200 Extension Professionals at their spring conference in Grantville on May 14. The group presented President Spanier with a print of Norman Rockwell's painting "The County Agent" as a welcome-to-Pennsylvania gift.

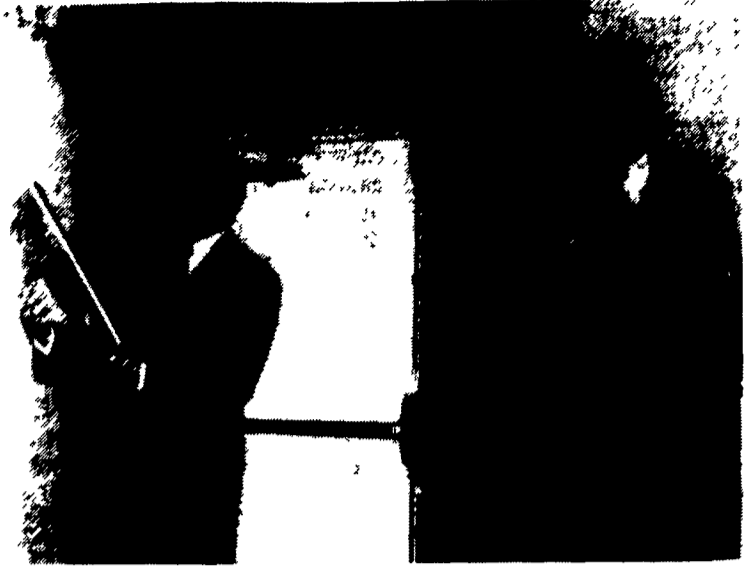
In his address the president discussed the imperatives for, and the capacity of, a university extension system. The imperatives are flexible and focused learning oppor-

tunities, and programming to help families and youth.

The imperatives were set in the context of great historical change and great social need. The Land Grant Universities have helped the agricultural industry adopt and profit from such changes as environmental concerns, computers, robotics, global markets, and biotechnology. Social need is too easily demonstrated by such statistics as engagement in 2 or more risky behaviors by half the youth between 10 and 17 years of age.

Past success and new technology suggests that the university can assist the 80 percent of the citizens who believe additional education is important for their job future. These citizens need flexible and focused opportunities to pursue this education. The Cooperative Extension Service provides the ideal model for this according to President Spanier.

Penn State University has significant capacity to aid citizens in many areas, but especially with families and youth and career development. President Spanier envisions the greatest impact of the University occurring when teaching, research, and service are fully integrated university wide. He believes the goal to be reached is clear, however the structure to accomplish the goal is still under development.

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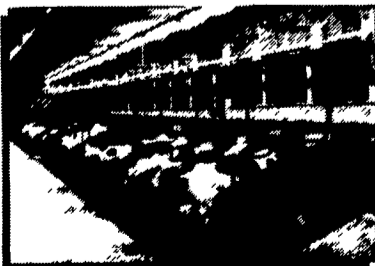
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
