Grain and soybean bids fell sharply lower in volatile trading. Heavy profit taking on the board and some optimism on the traders part drove bids downward. Wheat 25 to 30 cents lower. Corn 9 to 17 cents lower. Sorghum 21 to 40 cents lower. Soy-

beans 10 to 27 cents lower. Winter wheat harvest continues in Texas and moving into Oklahoma where fair yields have been reported. Spring wheat planting in the Northern areas has made some headway due to recent sunshine. However, they are still behind the norm and rain is in the forecast for this weekend. Heavy fund selling on the board today was a pressure factor. Corn bids fell sharply due to profit taking on the board. The corn crop is looking good so far with beneficial rains offering weakness to bids. Eastern Corn Belt got a few more acres of corn planted over the holiday weekend but parts of Illinois and Indiana fell further behind and many are giving up on corn for this year. Tomados, torrential down pours and floods covered some of the corn that was up and looking good back over into the Western Corn Belt. The continued lack of export business this week, weighed on all commodities. Bean bids followed wheat and corn lower due to profit taking. Planting was noted in some areas of the Midwest after a drying spell. Ohio and east fared better than Illinois and Indiana. Heavy rains this past weekend flooded fields in many places, including parts of the Western Corn Belt. Plenty of time yet to plant soybeans but many farmers are getting antsy.
