Compared to last week: Feeder and stockers steers firm. Feeder heifers over 700 lbs weak to 2.00 lower. Lighter weight heifers steady to 1.00 higher. Demand good with exception of light demand for new crop calves. Quality of supply much improved from last week's mostly plain offerings. Quality of supply average thru attractive. Feeder cattle flesh medium. Weigh-ups not improved and average to full. Storms throughout much of Oklahoma over the weekend gave relief to dry pastures and hope for hay. 

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
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
