USMEF, NCBA Forge New Partnership

DENVER, Colo. — The U.S. Meat Export Federation (USMEF) and the National Cattlemen's Beef Association (NCBA) began a new era of cooperation and support with the signing of the first ever partnership agreement between the two organizations at the mid-year meeting of the USMEF Board of Directors in Chicago last week.

"We're building strength on strength," said USMEF President and CEO Philip Seng. "This new agreement will enable each organization to focus on what it does best, eliminating duplication and enhancing performance as it relates to the industry's long range plan," said Seng.

NCBA CEO Chuck Schroeder said the new agreement is about partnership and building a foundation for marketing U.S. beef globally in the future.

"The relationship described in this agreement between USMEF and NCBA is, indeed, a true partnership where organizations and individuals with like objectives and complementary skills agree to join forces for the good of the

industry," said Schroeder. "Absent that spirit, this agreement would not have been possible, certainly not in the time frame in which it was completed," he added.

While the USMEF/NCBA agreement won't officially take effect until Oct. 1, 1996, Seng noted that the spirit of the agreement has been evident for months as the two organizations worked together to develop a global marketing plan and budget for the coming year.

Under the agreement, USMEF will contract with NCBA to develop international markets for the American beef industry. The agreement touches all aspects of the USMEF/NCBA relationship, including marketing, trade policy, communications and association services.

USMEF's current checkoff contract for international market development is with the Cattlemen's Beef Board. This contract expires on Sept. 30, 1996, and will be replaced by the new USMEF partnership agreement with NCBA.

For its financial investment in USMEF, the NCBA will appoint 13 directors to serve on the USMEF board of directors — 12 from the marketing/checkoff side and one from the dues/policy side. Most of these directors, if not all, are expected to serve on the USMEF Beef and Allied Industries Committee.

Export sales of U.S. beef and beef variety meats to international markets hit a record 938,000 metric tons in 1995 and were valued at

\$3.3 billion. This, according to CF Resources, Inc., amounted to 12.7 percent of the wholesale value of total U.S. beef production, up from 4.2 percent just 10 years ago.

According to the latest USDA data, U.S. beef exports (including beef variety meats) were up 23 percent for the Jan-March 1996 period, compared to the same period last year.

EPA Approves Postemergence Labels

GREENSBORO, N.C. — Just in time for use on corn this spring, EPA has registered Dual II®, Bicep II® and Bicep Lite II® for postemergence applications.

Ciba Crop Protection sought the expanded label to give producers even more application flexibility when using these products. The labels already allowed early preplant, incorporated, and premergence applications.

"The new postemergence label

provides total application flexibility if weather keeps growers out of the field early, or if they want to add another layer of residual control," said Frank Knight, product manager for Bicep II and Bicep Lite II.
