Rains and floods in Iowa made problems, but also made corn and soybeans. This induced record breaking price declines, corn suffered the most. Wheat steady to 1 cent higher, with St. Louis 5-8 cents lower. Corn 20-40 cents lower. Sorghum 20 to 50 cents lower. Soybeans 16-18 cents lower. Winter wheat harvest just about a done deal. Overall yields better than expected, but some late harvest problems showing up in the Eastern cornbelt. Spring wheat mostly headed out and for the most part crops look good. No export orders this week. Rains and good corn pollinating weather put the hammer on prices. Early corn has already made a good crop. Another 2-3 inch rain next month with a couple of cool days for pollination and late plantings could come up with very good yields. Kansas City truck corn 62 to 65 cents lower in three days trading so far this week. September corn lost 18 cents on the Board today and some elevators got scared and took another 30 to extremes of 40 points off their basis. Producers are wondering what this Fall will look like. September corn futures 1.00 below July and another 30 cents off for December. Unusually large number of acres of soybeans that were no-till behind wheat combines now are emerging above the stubble. The new plants are turning green and shading the ground from the hot drying sun. Look out for early frost. November beans on the Board only 34 cents below July. Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds was light to fair at best. Offerings were fully adequate on the over 3 pound sizes; adequate to short on the smaller sizes. Live supplies were at least moderate; weights were in a full range of light to heavy, mostly desirable to heavy. Processing schedules were moderate to heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged at 61 to 75 cents. Trade sentiment was steady to barely steady. In the parts complex, breast items were readily available at some plants, in good balance at others. Leg quarters were in heaviest supply and were generally slow in clearing. Wings were balanced to short.
