

Penn State Dairy Science Club Wins National Honor

UNIVERSITY PARK (Centre Co.) — The Penn State Dairy Science Club was recognized as the nation's outstanding chapter at the 1996 American Dairy Science Association annual meeting held recently at Oregon State University.

The award is based on club activities, participation in meetings and publications.

Following Penn State in the rankings were Virginia Tech in second and the University of Kentucky in third.

This represented Penn State's third national championship in four years and sixth overall.

Over the past year, Penn State added Jerseys to the Nittany Lion Fall Classic, introduced the Junior All-Breeds Convention, and restructured the Daily Exposition

to include more events for consumers and non-agricultural students. Overall, the club focused its major activities on youth and consumer education.

The Penn State Dairyman placed first in the yearbook competition, followed by publications from Virginia Tech and Minnesota.

In the undergraduate paper pre-

sentations, Kara Tussey, a senior in dairy and animal science from Huntingdon, placed first in the manufacturing division with her talk, "Light-Induced Flavors in Milk." Jennifer Vallimont, a junior Dairy and Animal Science major from Clearfield, placed second in the production division with her discussion, "The Effects of Grazing Systems on Herd Health."

Carrie Bryant, a senior dairy and animal science major from Honesdale, was elected president of the ADSA Student Affiliate Division after completing her term as second vice-president at the meeting.

She currently serves as Penn State Dairy Science Club president and Penn State Academic Assembly vice-president.

Club co-adviser Dale Olver was elected first-year adviser to the student affiliate.

Marel Raub, a May graduate in dairy and animal science from Duncannon, represented Penn State in the outstanding student competition, won by Libby Hupf from the University of Minnesota. Raub earlier was named Northeast Student Affiliate Outstanding Senior and is to begin law school at Dickinson College in September.

Overall, 12 undergraduate students and two advisers represented Penn State.

Students attending include Bryant, Tussey, Vallimont, Raub, Heidi Stephens, Jermyn; Nancy Kerr, Carmichaels; Aaron Harpster, Spruce Creek; Rachel Tanis, Centre Hall; Charles Houpp, Oley; Howard Reyburn, Oxford; Joshua Harvatin, Thompson; and Michael Hix, Bernville. Advisers Lawrence Muller and Dale Olver accompanied the group.

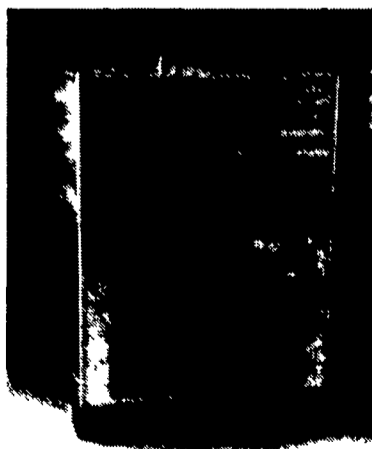

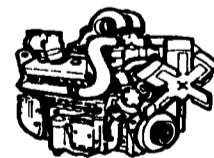
