Chester County Dairy Milk Lines Walter Wurster Extension Dairy Agent

This will be my last column for Lancaster Farming. I will be retiring on September 30th. We have been assured that my position will be replaced with basically the same job description as I have been operating under the past seven years — dairy, agronomy, 4-H dairy & tractor safety and water quality. How soon a new agent will be hired is uncertain at this time.

My first career after graduating from Penn State was developing, with my family, a successful dairy farm and a herd of Registered Holsteins which I operated for over 30 years. When my knees and hips began showing the wear and tear of milking in a stall barn, I was lucky enough to find an opportunity to be an Extension agent in Chester County. It has been a very satisfying experience because of the great farm families and residents of the county that I have had the privilege to know and work with. I will probably still do some volunteer work if I am asked because I am told that the most important priority for a successful retirement is to keep busy.

As I look into the crystal ball

and consider how Extension can best serve the dairy industry and specifically Chester County farmers, I see some positive signs for the future. The County Commissioners are taking a serious look at how they can give farmer owners some tax relief using new updated values for Act 319, the Clean & Green Law. I have been working on this project for a number of years and with new assessments coming out in early 1997, final values are being refined at this

Another area is Penn State's initiative to develop programs in the future that will target the needs of the Pennsylvania dairy industry. The former dairy agent in the county, Dave Swartz, told me that I would really have to be on my toes to keep ahead of the dairy farmers in Chester County. Well, was he ever right! It seems that whenever a new, innovative idea came along during the past seven years, I would get a call from a dairy farmer. Of course, that is what made the job so interesting. I believe that Extension programs in the future will focus more on one, two or three-day workshops that will be on specific subjects. When a farmer completes a session he or she will have an indepth understanding of the topic and be comfortable applying the principles learned on their operation.

With all the information that is available to farmers today, sometimes the biggest problem is separating the wheat from the chaff; or what is applicable to a particular farm and what is totally useless for that farm. One of the


strongest assets of Extension is that it is a non-partisan evaluator of ideas and applications that are proposed by agri-business. Many ideas appear great on the surface, but cannot stand the test of controlled research conducted at universities. It is important that Extension agents continue to work with and support agri-business while at the same time being objective in evaluating products and concepts. I have really enjoyed working with the 4-H program and I am indebted to the volunteer leaders that have contributed so much of their time to make the program successful. Teaching kids values, leadership and information is the best way to insure a sound agricultural industry in the future.

I have always been a positive thinker — I believe the glass is half full, not half empty. Therefore, I have faith that the dairy industry and the farming community in Chester County will continue to be strong because of the quality of people who are driving the tractors and caring for the livestock. My thoughts and prayers will be with you as we all move into the 21st century.


