And they didn't even bother to get in touch with the coalition, according to Christine Bushway, coalition director. Bushway, of CMB Victory Company in North Hampton, N.H., spoke to about 60 producers Wednesday morning during the egg producers' segment of the two-day Northeast Poultry Show at the Holiday Inn Lancaster Host.

Bushway said that the coalition faxed all the information available about the successful Pennsylvania Egg Quality Assurance Program (PEQAP), what some call the "Cádillac" of egg quality assurance

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
