AMERICA'S FIRST LEXICOGRAPHER

ctober 16 marks the birthday, in 1758, of Noah Webster, author of the first American dictionary. Webster made his living as a lawyer, journalist, and school teacher, but we tend to remember him for the many words he folded into the Compendious Dictionary of the English Language, published in 1806, and, in 1828, the American Dictionary of the English Language In 1783 his American Spelling Book appeared, which first Americanized the English spelling of such words as "colour" and "labour" by dropping the u Webster wrote his dictionaries in longhand

Apple peelings should be included in cooking apple jelly, for that's where most of the pectin is stored.

CRAB APPLE JELLY

3 pounds crab apples, washed and cut, but not cored or peeled water, to cover

1 cup sugar to each cup of strained juice (about 4 cups, more or less)

oil crab apples in water until soft. Wet jelly bag and strain crab apples through this. (For clear jelly, do not squeeze bag.) Have sterilized jelly jars ready, dry but hot Measure the juice.

then simmer in a stainless steel pot for 5 minutes. Skim froth, then add sugar. Simmer about 10 minutes, until jelly thickens and drops from a spoon in sheets (about 220° F). Skim foam and pour jelly into sterilized jars, to within 1/2 inch of top if topping with paraffin (use

1/8 inch of wax), or to within 1/8 inch of top for two-piece metal jar tops. Seal, cool, and store in cool, dark, dry place.

Makes about 4 cups.

OCTOBER 9, 1996 Compared to last Monday: Feeder steers and heifers steady to 1.00 higher. Demand very good for feeders. Steer and heifer calves steady to 2.00 higher, most advance on heavier weight steer calves and plainer heifer calves. Calf demand good with considerable improvement on heifers. Quality plain to average, few attractive calves. Large supply of thin Brahman cross feeders with no discounting despite the fall season. This indicating good demand from Texas feedlots. Feeder cattle in medium to thin flesh; calves medium to fleshy conditions. Weigh-ups average to full. Weather perfect last week for planting wheat. State is approximately 2/3rds planted through today. Slaughter cows and bulls steady. Packer demand moderate with all areas participating but Texas buyers most aggressive. Country buyers continue to gather nearly all the thin young cows and bred cows under 7 years old for winter grazing. 840 cows and bulls sold with 65 percent to packers. Receipts this week 11.925; last week 10,434; last year 8,476. Supply consisted of 60 percent yearlings and calves over 600 lbs; 33 percent calves under 600 lbs; 7 percent cows and bulls. Prices follow with weighted average weight and price in parenthesis. 




