In the parts complex, breast items were in balance to closely cleared. Leg quarters were adequate to fully adequate at most locations. Wings were adequate to short.

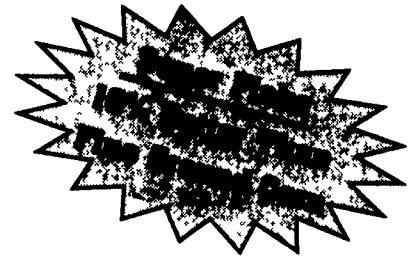
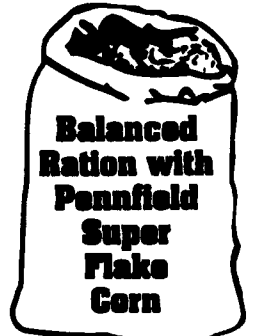
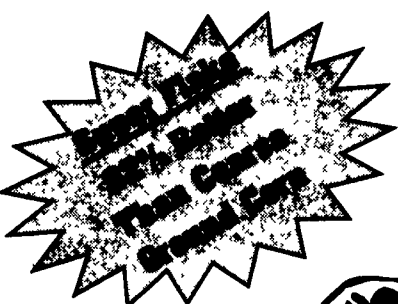


**Super Flake is #1 in Rumen Availability**

A summary presented at the 1992 Florida "Large Herd Management Conference" by Dr. David Mertens of the U.S. Forage Lab gave the following results:

<u>Corn Processing</u>	<u>% Ruminal Digestion</u>
Dry, Coarse Grind	65%
Dry, Medium Grind	74%
Dry, Fine Grind	78%
High-Moisture Ensiled, Coarse	82%
High-Moisture Ensiled, Fine	85%
Steam Flaked, Thin Flake	86%

More proof! Pennfield sponsored experiments at two universities in 1995 showed similar improvements in Rumen Availability using Super Flaked Corn.
