HARRISBURG (Dauphin Co.) - Pennsylvania dog licenses are now on sale for 1997 at all county treasurer's offices, according to Agriculture Secretary Charles C. Brosius.

Available

"There has been a change in the state law, and all puppies three months of age and older need to be licensed by Jan. 1 each year," Brosius said. "A dog license serves as a positive means of identification for your pet and can help ensure that lost dogs are returned to their owners.

"It is a small, but smart investment to start off the new year with a tag that makes your dog easily identifiable."

A license for a dog that has not been spayed or neutered is \$8. Licenses for spayed or neutered dogs are \$6. Licenses for dogs owned by senior citizens or handicapped citizens are \$6; for spayed or neutered, \$4. A regular lifetime license is \$51; for spayed or neutered \$31. If a license is purchased from an agent of the county treasurer, an additional 50 cents will be charged.

Owners of a dog without a valid license may be fined up to \$300 plus court costs for each dog in violation of the law.
