"BEST THING SINCE SLICED BREAD"

anuary 18, 1943, was when the sale of sliced bread was discontinued until the end of World War II. How much of a hardship was it? Prices had been going up and up, despite the scarcity of butter. (Most butterfat was being diverted to the manufacture of cheese.) Margarine was subject to a ten percent tax if it was artificially colored, so more and more Americans colored their own with vegetable dyes or used it white. Sliced bread had been around for only about a dozen years, first introduced by the Wonder Bread company of Battle Creek, Michigan, in 1930 Consumers were wary at first; sliced bread went stale quicker. But the convenience caught on

2 eggs

2 scant cups flour, sifted 1 scant tablespoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon baking soda 1/4 teaspoon salt

1/3 cup fresh lemon juice

PRODUCE

1/2 cup buttermilk
1 cup chopped
walnuts

Preheat oven to 350° F. Cream the butter and sugar, add the eggs, and beat. Sift dry ingredients into this and add lemon juice and buttermilk. Beat just enough to mix, then add nuts. Pour into a greased loaf pan and

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
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
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
