More E-85 Vehicles

ST. LOUIS, Mo. — The Ford Motor Co. announced plans to quadruple production of its E-85 Taurus model automobiles. Ford took offers for 3,200 of the E-85 vehicles this year. The cars, which can run on 85 percent ethanol and 15 percent unleaded gasoline, completely sold out.

"This commitment on the part of a major U.S. automaker shows we can continue to grow the market for E-85 fuel," said Bill Northey, president of the National Corn Growers Association (NCGA).

Most ethanol is made from corn, and the national corn organization and its affiliated state associations and boards work in partnership with the Governor's Ethanol Coalition (GEC) to install E-85 pumps at

out the U.S. In addition to building more E-85 vehicles, Ford will offer the flexible fuel vehicles for \$345 less than identical models of its Taurus that run only on

unleaded gas. "The purpose of the cost savings is to show our support for the E-85 infrastructure program currently under way," said Ford spokesperson Karen Holtschneider. "While drivers will be able to refuel with gasoline, we would like to see them use E-85."

The National Ethanol Vehicle Coalition expects E-85 pumps at 40 existing gas stations to be fully functional by the end of the year. The E-85 model Taurus can run on the 85 percent ethanol blend or regular unleaded gas.
