### Average Farm Feed Costs For Reference

To help farmers across the state to have handy reference of commodity input costs in their feeding operations for DHIA record sheets or to develop livestock feed cost data, here's last week's average costs of various ingredients as compiled from regional reports across the state of Pennsylvania.

Remember, these are averages, so you will need to adjust your figures up or down according to your location and the quality of your crop

Corn, No.2y — 3.045 bu., 5.45 cwt.

Wheat, No. 2 — 4.02 bu., 6.71 cwt.

Barley, No. 3 — 3.12 bu., 6.68 cwt.

Oats, No. 2 — 2.26 bu., 7.05

Soybeans, No. 1 — 7.21 bu., 12.04 cwt.

Ear Corn — 82.12 ton, 4.12 cwt. Alfalfa Hay — 137.50 ton, 6.875 cwt.

Mixed Hay — 133.90 ton, 6.70

Timothy Hay — 122.50 ton, 6.125 cwt.

# Farmland Trust, Ag Preserve Board Focus On Helping Plain Sect Farmers

Also included in the discussion was the need to explain both preservation programs to township planning commissions so that townships may become more sympathetic to preservation and be able to clear up misconceptions individuals may have about farm preservation.

To date more than 200 farm totally 14,000 acres are on the waiting list. In 1998, the preserve board will be required to use a ranking system when selecting farms to preserve with state monies. The Preserve Board wants to make certain that an even handed approach is used in ranking when funds become available and will use Trust funds in helping to purchase easements on farms that may not rank as

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"Confidence from the public has grown since the Ag Preserve Board was established in 1980 and the Farmland Trust in 1988," Stouffer said. "We have had tremendous increasing support from agribusiness."


This support enabled the Trust to preserve more farms and exceed the funding of last year's goal.

Both organizations will continue working in the same direction characterized by closely working together.

In the past, joint board meetings of both preservation organizations met annually. But, Stouffer said that they plan to conduct smaller meetings several times throughout the year to focus on strategies.

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
