Sorghum 2 cents lower. Soybeans 7 to 11 cents lower. Less damage than expected for hard red winter wheat has been reported. However, harvest will be the final prognosis. Spring wheat planting is going well at this time and some rain is forecast next week in the dry areas. Com bids were pressured by active planting, profit taking on the board, and lack of export sales this week. Traders believe we might have a large crop this year with all the planting being reported. Soybean planting has begun and is also going well. Favorable weather in the Midwest this week has been a blessing to farmers. Export demand has been nil for beans this week, also adding weakness to bids. Lower meal demand was a declining factor in beans bids. 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
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
