

Core Named National Dairy Shrine Guest Of Honor

COLUMBUS, OH — Maurice E. Core, Columbus, Ohio, has been named 1997 National Dairy Shrine Guest of Honor. One of the most prestigious awards in the dairy industry, it will be presented to Core at the annual National Dairy Shrine awards banquet on October 2, 1997 in Madison, Wisconsin in conjunction with the World Dairy Expo.

Core's entire life has been devoted to the dairy industry. He has been a longtime employee of the American Jersey Cattle Association and supporter of the dairy industry.

Growing up on a Jersey farm near Indianola, Iowa, Core attended Simpson College and Iowa State University graduating with a Bachelor of Science degree in agriculture.

Following graduation, he was herdsman for the Jersey and Guemsey herds at Curtiss Candy Farms, Cary, Illinois.

His next position kicked off a 37 year career with the American Jersey Cattle Association. He began as Field Representative covering eight midwestern states. He also served as Special Representative coordinating the All

American; Executive Assistant responsible for the Jersey Journal, Youth Programs, All American and Jersey Marketing Service. His career culminated as the Association Executive Secretary and President of All-Jersey Sales Corporation.

During his tenure at Jersey, Core was the first coordinator of Jersey Marketing Service (JMS). In 1976 JMS managed the Nation-

al Jersey Heifer Sale and the following year they also managed the All American Jersey Sale. The growth and success of JMS has led many dairy leaders to label it the most successful dairy breed association marketing service developed to date.

Core has served in many leadership positions within the dairy industry, including director of the National Purebred Dairy Cattle Association and Council on Dairy

Cattle Breeding; member of the Dairy Advisory Committee for the North American International Livestock Exposition and Ohio State University Dairy Science Department, and Past President of National Dairy Shrine.

Core and his wife Carole have three children; Cinthia Rowley and David Core, who reside in Columbus, Ohio and Sharin Adkins of Orient, Ohio.

Bair Speaks For Pennsylvania Dairy Stakeholders

HARRISBURG (Dauphin Co.) — N. Alan Bair, director of dairy industry relations for The Pennsylvania State University's College of Agricultural Sciences, testified this week before the U.S. Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry on the efforts of the Pennsylvania Dairy Stakeholders to continue the viability of the Pennsylvania dairy industry.

"Our focus has continued to be the profitability of dairy farms," Bair said. "The price volatility

which the industry is currently experiencing is one component of the overall economic reality on dairy farms." The purpose of the hearing was to receive testimony regarding the agricultural commodity price volatility.

He added that the Stakeholders, through task forces, will address both educational and motivational needs of producers. "Economic forces in the dairy industry are creating a constant need for change by dairy producers. Risk management will be just one of many skills dairy farm business

owners need to succeed."

Bair told the committee that the leadership role of government should include developing world markets for dairy products, continuing to support Cooperative Extension and agricultural research and encouraging the partnership of industry, education and government. He testified at the Senate hearing at the invitation of U.S. Senator Rick Santorum.

"The Dairy Stakeholders are committed to making positive things happen within the dairy industry," Bair said. One current initiative is helping non-agricultural audiences recognize the economic importance of the dairy industry to local, regional and state economies.

Pennsylvania's dairy industry represents 38 percent of the state's agricultural economy. Pennsylvania is the fourth largest dairy state in the country.

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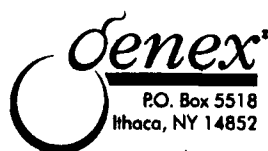
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
