ly Cattle Summary Compared to last week: Feeder steers steady to 3.00 higher; steer calves 1.00-3.00 lower. Feeder heifers and heifer calves steady. Demand moderate to good early, turning light in late trade. Quality mostly plain to average. Feeder cattle in slightly thin to medium conditions. Calves in medium to moderate flesh conditions. Weigh-ups average to full. Many pastures dry and general rain needed to sustain summer grass and start the rye pastures. Slaughter cows and bulls 1.00-2.50 lower. Demand from packers moderate. Total of 700 cows and bulls sold with 70 percent going to packers. Receipts this week 11,700; last week: 10,970; last year 9,498. Supply consisted of 67 percent yearlings and few calves over 600 lbs; 27 percent calves under 600 lbs; 6 percent cows and bulls. Prices follow with weighted average weight and price in parenthesis.
