All the dairy, financial, and field records are kept on three computers in the farm office. Cow comfort is evident in the barn as well. Bedding in the free stalls consists of chopped rubber covered with a sheet of canvas. Curtain sides and a vented roof provide natural air-flow along with fans and a sprinkler system to keep the cows cool in summer. The cows are fed in four groups according to production and stages of lactation. One group is made up of all the two year-old milking


