 Wheat bids were mixed, mostly lower for the day. Slow export demand over the past few days and continued higher corn and bean bids, weighed on wheat. Corn and soybean bids moved higher for the fifth

consecutive day with sharp gains the past couple of days. Slow farmer selling of new crop corn and beans in hopes of higher bids, supported the corn and bean markets. Gains were limited, however, due to continued harvest pressure and lack of fresh export news. Wheat mixed, mostly 1 to 4 cents lower. Corn 2 to 7 cents higher. Sorghum 2 to 5 cents higher. Soybeans 3 to 5 cents higher.
