Northeast DHIA Reviews Progress At 10th Annual Meeting

ITHACA, N.Y. — As the region's dairy farmers faced a year of economic challenges, the Northeast Dairy Herd Improvement Association (DHIA) re-examined its businesses, focusing on developing more relevant services and lowering costs to farmers.

At the Northeast DHIA annual meeting, held recently in Ithaca, N.Y., Harold W. Bodwell III, President of the Northeast DHIA Board of Directors, chronicled the organization's achievements of the past year, particularly highlighting the creation of Cooperative Dairy One, an information technology venture with Dairylea Cooperative Inc.

Known as Dairy One, the venture began operations in early 1997 with the purpose of developing technologies and services to meet the information demands necessary for progressive dairy management. At the same time, the alliance allows for the elimination of overlapping operations, thereby increasing the economic efficiencies for both organizations, which benefits their respective memberships.

During his remarks, Bodwell noted the significant savings that were realized in the past year through both the creation of Dairy One and the streamlining of Northeast DHIA.

"In serving our membership we will continue to address the changing structure of the dairy industry," said Bodwell. "Our challenge remains the same --- how to provide the right herd management information at a competitive cost."

Rick Smith, Chief Executive Officer of Dairy One, addressed the delegate body providing an overview of the current Northeast milk pricing climate, as well as the changes occurring within the dairy industry.

"We do not feel good knowing that many of our members are caught in the cost/price squeeze of today's milk marketing environment," stated Smith. "This has led to a decrease in the number of farms in the Northeast, which affects the entire agriculture infrastructure. We must continue to develop new ventures and partnerships — much like Dairy One in order to create innovative services that enhance dairy farmers' potential for profitability," Smith

Following Smith's report, Dr. Arden Nelson, a veterinarian with Dairy Production Services, modcrated a panel that reviewed several of the newer and more innovative services available through Dairy One.

Panel member Scott Flowers, of Harper Farms in Savannah, N.Y., discussed using Dairy Comp 305 herd management software to the track changes in his 200-milking cow operation. "I think Dairy Comp 305 is one of the best tools I have ever purchased. It allows me to quickly access and analyze my information," Flowers said.

The use of Milk Urea Nitrogen (MUN) Analysis, an analysis performed on milk samples to measure the amount of protein cows are using in the ration, was addressed by panelist Rick Holdridge of Humdinger Holsteins in Bloomville, N.Y. "We are constantly asking ourselves if we are profitable," said Holdridge. "MUN analysis gives us a way to check on whether or not we are feeding too much. It costs us \$6 for MUN testing and \$3,000 a month for grain. So, for only \$6, we can keep close track of a major

Paul Sirois, DHI Forage Lab Manager, rounded out the panel by presenting information on the new In-Vitro procedure, which can fine tune the energy predictions of feed. "In-Vitro methods attempt to simulate digestive processes that naturally occur in the animal, in particular, the microbial breakdown of forages in the rumen," reported Sirois.

Currently, the DHI Forage Lab is one of only a few laboratories in the United States to offer In-Vitro analysis as a commercial service.

Jamie Zimmerman, Assistant to the CEO, reviewed the progress made by Dairy One since its inception in early 1997. Zimmer-

man noted that the sample transportation systems of Dairylea and Northeast DHIA were combined into a single Dairy One sample transportation system in January, resulting in improved service and turnaround for both organizations. In April, Dairy One purchased a calibration unit and began providing a bulk tank calibration service throughout the Northeast region. Additionally, expansion of the milk analysis laboratory occurred in early summer resulting in a state-of-the-art laboratory that performs all milk testing from traditional DHIA sample analysis to producer payment analysis, as well as calibration and control samples and bacteria analysis.

"Dairy One will continue to explore ways in which both Dairylea and Northeast DHIA can work to improve services and profitability to Northeast dairy producers,' said Zimmerman.

At an evening banquet, past and present Directors of Northeast DHIA honored former General Manager Nelvin Empet, who recently retired after 20 years of service to the Cooperative.

Northeast DHIA Records Services currently provide service in the nine state region of Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine.
