He has published four books and more than 175 articles on financial and business related topics in journals, extension, and other popular publications. He has received 11 major teaching awards and four major extension and public service awards from VPI and Cornell University. Most recently Kohl was recipient of the prestigious American Agricultural Economics Association Outstanding Teaching Award for professionals with more than 10 years of service in

He is only one of five professors in the 78-year history of the Association to receive the award twice. He received the award for under 10 years of service in 1984, and received the Virginia Governor's Award for his distinguished service to Virginia agriculture, the youngest recipient of this award.
