HARRISBURG (Dauphin Co) - The Pennsylvania Farm Show Scholarship Foundation on Thursday announced the selection of its fifth annual scholarship winners at the 1998 Farm Show junior livestock sale of champions

The scholarship committee awarded scholarships worth \$2,000 each to 13 Pennsylvania youth who are pursuing a degree at a post-secondary institution

Agricultural Secretary Samuel E Hayes Jr assisted in the presentation of awards.

Criteria for selection includes scholarship; leadership in school, community, and 4-H or FFA, participation in the Farm Show, and financial need.

Money for scholarships comes from a fund established following the 1993 Farm Show sale of champion.

A non-profit foundation was established to administer contributions and distribute scholarship money At the conclusion of this year, the fund will have provided \$83,000 to students.

The Farm Show Scholarship Foundation has established an Ambassador's Club, a non-profit, tax-exempt organization, intended to increase scholarship funds for more rural youth.


