Tractor Safety Course Set

WEST CHESTER (Chester Co.) - If you are between the ages of 14 and 16 and wish to work on a farm (other than your parents'), you are required to have a certificate showing that you completed a tractor safety course.

Penn State Cooperative Extension and Octorara High School's Vo-Ag Department jointly present the 1998 Tractor and Farm Machinery Safety

> Course on Mondays, April 6, 13, 20 and 27, from 6:30 p.m. - 9 p.m. at Octorara High School, Atglen.

A tractor driving session will be scheduled on a Saturday as well. The registration fee is \$12 and is due no later than March

This course is designed to give young people classroom and hands-on training in the safe operation of farm tractors and some farm machinery This is also a good program for young adults already operating machinery because of the emphasis on safe-

Upon successful completion of this course, candidates receive a Department of Labor certificate certifying that the student has completed the course and has mastered certain safety and operational skills of farm machin-
