Teen Challenge Becomes Berks Conservation Farm Of Year

REHRSBURG (Berks Co.) -Teen Challenge, a farm that serves as a rehabilitative center for men ages 18-60 based here. is the Berks County Conservation Farm of the Year.

The farm will be honored at the Berks County Conservation District Banquet at the 4-H Community Center in Leesport on Thursday, April 16, at 7 p.m.

The farm was profiled in the June 22, 1996 issue of Lancaster Farming.

Farm manager is Eric Hole. According to Randy McCormack, district conservationist with the county's USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Teen Challenge became a cooperator with the Berks County Conservation District on Feb. 25, 1970.

The farm, in Tulpehocken Township, manages approximately 384 acres comprising six tracts.

In the past, this has been a dairy operation and recently converted into a calf replacement farm. According to McCormack, over the years Teen Challenge has applied approximately 234 acres of stripcropping, 2,845 feet of diversions, 8,969 feet of subsurface drainage (tile), and about 1.4 acres (1,500-2,000 feet) of grassed waterways.

"Over the years, working with such an exceptional manager (Eric Hole) and dedicated soil conserva-
