Entries must be postmarked by midnight, June 2, to be eligible for the contest. Semi-finalists will be contacted to be present at the final judging which will take place June 27, at the Somerset County 4-H Center in Bridgewater.

The Grand Prize is a \$150 cash award; second prize is \$100 and third prize is \$50. All semifinalists will receive dairy promotion awards.
