### STRAWBERRY PIZZA

#### Crust:

- 1½ cups flour
- 1 cup butter
- ¼ cup brown sugar
- ¼ cup chopped pecans

Mix the above ingredients together and spread onto an ungreased 10x15 cookie sheet. Bake at 400 degrees for 10-15 minutes or until golden brown.

#### Filling:

- 8 ounces cream cheese
  - ¼ cup confectioners' sugar
  - 8-ounces whipped cream
- Mix these ingredients together and spread onto the cooled crust.

#### Topping:

- 3-ounces strawberry Jell-O
- ½ cup sugar
- 1 cup water
- 4 tablespoons corn starch
- 4 cups sliced strawberries

Mix first four ingredients together and cook until thickened. Cool, then add the strawberries. Place this mixture on top of the cream cheese mixture and chill.
