Sanitation Training

HONESDALE (Wayne Co.) ---Between 6.5 and 80 million people suffer from food borne illnesses each year. In 1993, an outbreak of hamburger infected with E. coli 0157:H7 was associated with four deaths and over 500 cases of illness.

At least 41 percent of these outbreaks can be prevented each year with proper time and temperature control in food service operations.
