Heinzman rode her Arabian, Quintessa, to a championship in the mini stirrup division (for riders 10 and under), and then moved up to also win the short stirrup championship for riders aged 12 and under.

Jessica Knox on Star won the open equitation championship (for riders age 13 or older), and

the championship of the low hunter division. The pair were also the reserve champions of the hunter divisions.

Alicia Boyle, a Western rider, won championships in the western and the pleasure divisions with Desert Bold Fire, an Arabian owned by Dawn McCuen of Cochranville.

Hans Herr House Sets Heritage Day

WILLOW STREET (Lancaster Co.) - The Hans Herr House will hold its 19th annual Heritage Day on August 1, from 9 am, until 4 pm. This fun-filled farm festival features demonstrations of farm life and activities from the 18th century to the early 20th.

This year's theme is early food preparation, and the work involved in getting food from the field to the table. Threshing, flailing, and corn shelling will be demonstrated, and visitors will be able to see a smokehouse, outdoor bake oven, and Pennsylvania German raised hearth in operation, and to sample goodies from these sites. More modern fare is available at concession stands, such as roasted corn, rhubarb punch;

homemade root beer, hot dogs, pie, and ice cream.

Other demonstrations at Heritage Day include soapmaking, blacksmithing, paper making, linen processing, bobbin lace, scherenschnitte, and wool spinning. There are also children's activities, and various scheduled workshops on 18th century hymn singing and colonial clothing.

Admission to Heritage Days is \$5 for adults, 1 for children ages 7-12, 6 and under are free.
