## Annual Crop Management School Set At Ocean City

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The fourth annual Mid-Atlantic Crop Management School is scheduled Dec. 8-10 in the Princess Royale Oceanfront Hotel and Conference Center at Ocean City, Md.

While the school is structured to provide training and continuing education credits for certified crop advisers, it is open to anyone wanting to keep abreast of current developments in the realm of pest management, soil fertility, soil and water conservation, and crop management.

The school has been a success since its inception, according to this year's chairperson, Dr. Ronald L. Ritter, cooperative extension weed control specialist at the University of Maryland.

"Every year we try to bring in new speakers for each of our sugject-matter categories," Ritter said. "Some sessions are classroom presentations, while others

may involve hands-on training. This year we'll do hands-on training in insect and plant disease identification.'

Registration for the crop management school is limited to 150-200 people in order to keep training sessions from getting too large.

Classes will start on the morning of Dec. 8 and finish by noon Dec. 10. With sessions running concurrently, participants in the Certified Crop Adviser program will be able to receive sufficient credits in all four areas of the CCA Primary Performance Objectives. Speakers from several areas of the country are scheduled to appear during the sessions.
