**SUMMARY**

Sharp gains were made in grain and soybean bids Wednesday. A weaker US dollar, talks of Russian donations, and rain delayed harvest were all factors in the higher bids. Wheat 7 to 13 cents higher. Corn 6 to 10 cents higher. Sorghum 13 cents higher. Soybeans 8 to 15 cents higher. Wheat bids jumped higher on talks of China buying 1/2 million tonnes of EU feed wheat. Some fund buying on the Board was noted. Corn and soybean bids moved sharply higher for fourth consecutive day. Rain delayed harvest and the weaker US dollar offered support. Soybean bids also gained strength on higher meal and oil demand. The potential for up to 500,000 tonnes of meal donations to Russia also underpinned bids.
