Supplies were generally adequate to instances tight, and additional supplies continued to be maintained with confidence for holiday distribution; some operations ran extended grading hours to prepare cartoned eggs for holiday orders. Breaking stock supplies were no more than adequate for the irregular, but mostly light to moderate demand; finished product sales of liquid and frozen eggs continued very good. Light type hen supplies were no more than adequate for full slaughter schedules.


