steady to 2.00 higher. Demand good for feeders despite downward movement in CME Monday. Steer calves steady. Heifer calves 2.00-3.00 lower. Demand remains good for calves as wheat and rye pastures continue excellent. Quality plain to average and this well below last week. Weighups average. Calves in slightly thin through fleshy condition; feeders in thin to medium flesh. Slaughter cows steady. Slaughter bulls 1.00 higher. Packer demand moderate with best action from southern buyers. Replacement and feeder cow buyers remain aggressive. Cows and bulls totaled 650 head with 50 percent to packers. Receipts this week 10,050; last week 8,356; last year 9,855. Supply consisted of 32 percent yearlings and calves over 600 lbs; 62 percent calves under 600 lbs; 6 per-cent cows and bulls. Prices follow with weighted average weight and price in parenthesis.
