"It was a big adjustment for me to milk everyday when we first moved on the farm," Shirley said, "but I love it."

The children help out with household chores, but Shirley makes sure to find time to continue to bake—one of her hobbies.

Although the family shows at Lebanon Fair and All American, they won't be showing at the state Farm Show.

"That's because we don't really have enough help and time to keep everything running smoothly at home and at the Farm Show," said Paul, who has fond memories of showing when he was a teen-ager.

Despite the daily chores on the farm, the children are encouraged to take advantage of off-the-farm opportunities.

Two years ago, Jamie spent eight weeks in Brazil with a teen mission group.

"We lived in a tent and bathed in the creek. We even washed our clothes in the creek," Jamie said. The clothing was thrown away because it was impossible to remove the brownish white color from river washing.

"The experience really helped me to appreciate home," Jamie said. Dustin is planning on participating on a Teen Mission trip in the summer. Although it is not definite, he is counting on going to Alaska for 11 weeks.

Here are a few of the family's favorites, which uses dairy products. Guests rave over this cookie recipe that Shirley devised.

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





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
