Mary Thompson reported on Colerain Township, which was settled by immigrants from Coleraine, Ireland. Colerain Township has a population of 19,470. Most of the land was dairy farms until the Octorara Lake was built in 1948. In the early years, the milk was taken in cans to the Creamery in Kirkwood and Bartville, but in 1920, main roads were built and milk was picked up by truck and taken to Oxford. At one time, 10 mushroom houses existed but only one remains in operation. The telephone came into the area in 1908 at the Cyrus Barr store and electricity in 1929.

Education was very important. In addition to the Academy at Union, there were 10 public schools. Teachers were paid \$3 to \$5 a week, depending on the amount of students taught.

Fifty to 60 years ago, women got together to make vegetable soup, applesauce, and applebutter. In 1938, Amish started to move in and today, they continue to get together to make quilts, can and enjoy fellowship.


