Thanks to John Bosak, Harrisburg, who writes in regards to Karnow's decision to remove tree stumps with saltpeter here is some facts to know: Stump holes are filled and replenished with a water and saltpeter solution to permeate the stump and down to the root itself. This, in itself, does not remove the roots. It's the next step that does the job and is often omitted due to misunderstanding of the process. A fire is built over the stump to ignite the wood, which then burns like a punk, down to the roots, depending on the depth of penetration of the solution. This poses some danger of fire during a dry season and caution is advised.

Bosak also writes that saltpeter, KN03 is used as a meat preservative, fertilizer explosive, etc. It can be purchased in chemical supply houses and possibly at Agway stores for about \$17.50 for five pounds.
