CATTLE Compared to last week's closing prices, slaughter steers and heifers closed 50-1 00 higher. Gains were noticed at midweek and the market finished strong on a large offering. Local cattle feeders are starting to pull some fancy cattle out of their barns and runs are expected to be high in quality for the next several weeks. Our higher market was a pleasant surprise as the rest of the country sold mostly steady, instances 1 00 higher dressed. Midwestern fed cattle ended the week at 64 00 live and mostly 101 00 in the beef. Local Holstein steers closed steady to .50 higher in a fairly light test. Slaughter cows finished mostly steady to weak and bulls traded 1.00 lower. Supply included 52 percent slaughter steers, 7 percent slaughter heifers, 31 percent slaughter cows, 4 percent slaughter bulls, with the balance made up of feeder cattle.
