Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds was generally noted as light to fair for delivery of fill-in needs, cautious thereafter. Offerings were readily available on the smaller sizes; adequate to short on the over 3 pound sizes. Live supplies were at least moderate; weights were light to heavy, mostly light to desirable. Processing schedules was moderately heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged at 48 to 60 cents. Trade sentiment was steady but cautious. In the parts complex, machine cut wings were readily available and difficult to place. Other items were at least adequate but were generally under less pressure to sell.

GLANCE

In Chicago and the Eastern Region, prices were unchanged to sharply lower on all sizes. Elsewhere, prices were unchanged. The market tone ranged barely steady to weak, mostly weak. Retail demand was generally slow to fair with limited feature activity noted throughout the country. Supplies of jumbo eggs remained close, however, the balance of sizes were at least adequate to ample with the large and smaller eggs in the longest positions. Breaking stock supplies were fully sufficient from regular sources, and most trading continued to center around the attractively priced lighter weight product. Light type hens were fully adequate to ample for immediate slaughter requirements.

Liquid and frozen eggs (ingredients included) processed under federal inspection in the Eastern region for the week ending July 24, 1999 were 3% less than last week, and 7% less than the same week a year ago. Shell egg supplies were adequate from regular sources.
