

York Fair Junior Market Steer Show Gets 'Iced'

"Ice" was hot at the York Fair's junior market steer show, taking the grand champion honors for 10-year-old exhibitor Kim Long.

The Airville junior 4-H'er's crossbred steer was purchased from Montana, where the chilly weather earned him the "cold as ice" moniker. When the weather was far from cold during the past summer's heat extremes, "Ice" was chilled down with cooling fans in the Long family's barn on their Airville farm to keep him eating and growing to his show weight of 1,265 pounds. The champion win was the first for the third-year junior exhibitor.

Reserve champion Tammi Grubb likewise took the fan approach to battle summer-heat problems on her beef animals. She took the pink rosette placing with "Leo," an Angus-Maine crossbred

who weighed in at 1,157 pounds.

Entry numbers in the junior market steer show were down, as more exhibitors this year seemed to be aiming at Farm Show competition. Those younger beef animals competed in the increasingly-popular Prospect Class, with more than 20 entries this year.

Champion of the Prospect Steer runoff was Tammi Grubb with the heavyweight class winner, an Angus-Chianina-Maine crossbred named "Jazz."

Reserve champion prospect steer was the runner-up heavyweight, exhibited by Hope Long.

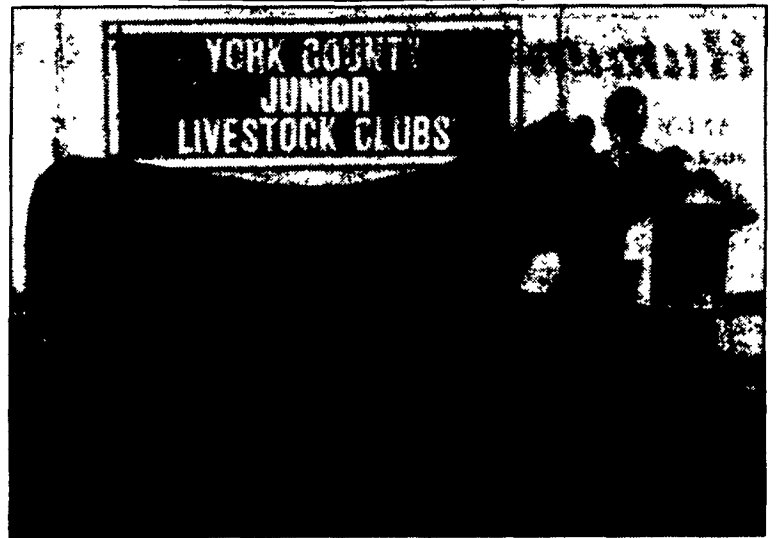

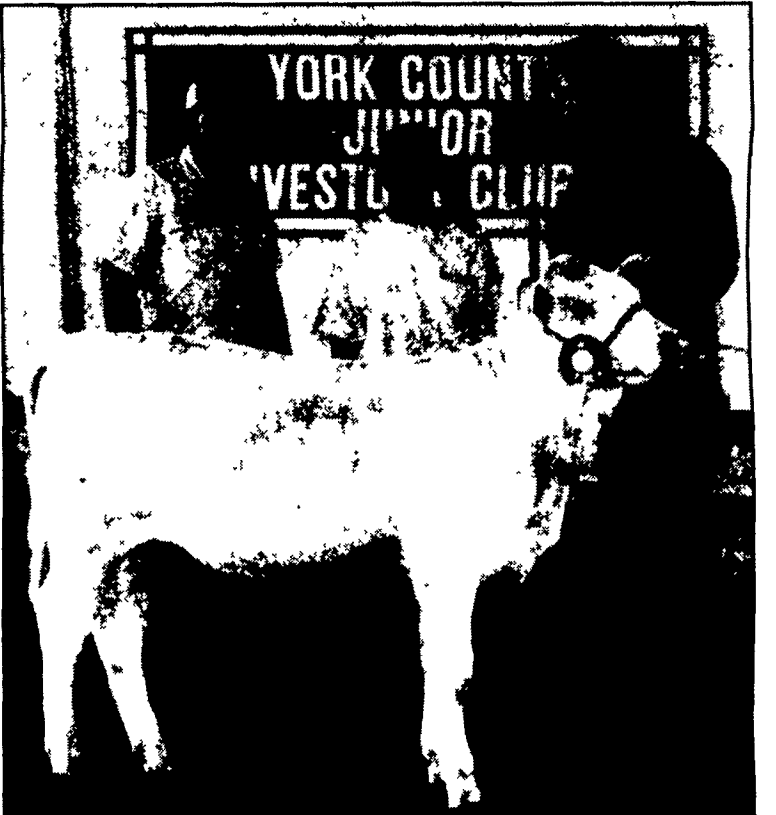

Glencoe sold for \$762, or \$6 per pound, to W.J. Brant for Chemgro Seeds.

The reserve champion county-bred lamb owned by Molly Enos sold for \$424, or \$4 per pound, to Swank's Steel City Shows.

The champion junior showman lamb owned by Breann Ritchey of Hyndman sold for \$342, or \$3 per pound, to Quality Farm and Fleet of Somerset.

The champion senior showman lamb owned by the late Christopher Shultz of Rockwood sold for \$2,074, or \$17 per pound, to Walker's Farm Service. The lamb was donated back to the scholarship fund and ultimately, after all bidding on other animals ended, resold 30 more times.

Christopher Shultz, 15, died early on Thursday, Aug. 26, in an all-terrain vehicle accident. Proceeds from reselling the lamb — approximately \$6,700 — will benefit his parents Roger and Joan Shultz and sister Nicole.

The High Ridge 4-H Club of which Chris Shultz was its president has begun a memorial fund in his honor.
