 Daily National Grain Market Summary
 USDA's crop production report, released this morning was expected to boost grain and soybean bids, but didn't. Some profit taking in corn pits and slow export sales this week pressured bids lower. Wheat 4 to 7 cents lower. Corn 3 to 8 cents lower. Sorghum 1 to 2 cents lower. Soybeans 11 to 15 cents lower. USDA increased their estimate for World wheat production by more than 255 million bushels and wheat bids fell moderately lower. World ending stocks were up from 128.12 million metric tons to 130.46 mmt. Declines were limited, however, on substantial wheat purchases overnight by Egypt and the Philippines. Sharp losses in corn pits, despite lower production figures compared to a year ago. However, if their figures are realized, this would be the third largest production and second highest yield on record. Corn production was forecast at 9.54 billion bushels, up 1 percent from October and 2 percent lower than 1998. The expected yield is at 134.5 bushels per acre, up 0.1 bushels from 1998. Soybean bids also fell sharply lower, despite the

lower production figure, but this was about what traders expected. Soybeans were estimated at 2.67 billion bushels, down 2 percent from 1998's record production of 2.74 billion bushels. Expected yield is at 36.7 bushels per acre which is 2.2 percent below 1998. Soybean meal and oil bids were also lower.
