Lebanon DHIA Conducts Meeting

LEBANON (Lebanon Co.) ---The Lebanon County Dairy Herd Improvement Association recently held its 70th annual banquet at Hoss's Steak and Sea House in Annville, with more than 100 in attendance. Ninety-seven nerus were on official test for the 1998/99 testing year. Lebanon placed 1st in milk production in the state for the 4th year in a row. The 7,590 cows on test in Lebanon County produced 22,879 pounds of milk per cow, 817 pounds of butterfat, and 729 pounds of protein. The county ranked 1st in milk per cow, 1st in butterfat per cow, and 1st in protein per cow. This year we lost 56 cows on test. However, the production per cow went down 18 pounds, butterfat was up 2 pounds, and protein went up 11 pounds. The total income over feed costs was \$2,275, and the total feed costs were \$1,246. County average was \$246 better than the state average on income over feed costs. It is apparent managers must become very

astute decision makers to survive into the next millennium.

Conferences Set

COLLEGE PARK, Md. --- Fac-

ing continued low commodity prices, many farmers in the Mid-Atlantic area have shown interest in growing hay as a cash crop.

To help these farmers make informed decisions and maximize their chance of success, the Maryland-Delaware Forage Council has scheduled hay marketing and handling conferences at two locations in mid-December.

The first conference will be Dec. 15 at the Carroll County Ag Center, off Highway 32 in Westminster, Md., for the convenience of growers west of the Chesapeake Bay. An identical conference is scheduled Dec. 16 at the Caroline County 4-H Park, south-

west of Denton on Highway 16. It is intended for Delmarva area growers.

The featured speaker on both days will be David Fink, a wellknown hay and straw grower and forage equipment dealer at Germansville (Lehigh County) in east central Pennsylvania. There also will be roundtable discussion sessions with hay producers, dealers, and buyers.

Registration for both conferences will begin at 8:45 a.m., with program sessions running from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Conference organizers include cooperative extension agricultural educators in both Maryland and Delaware.
