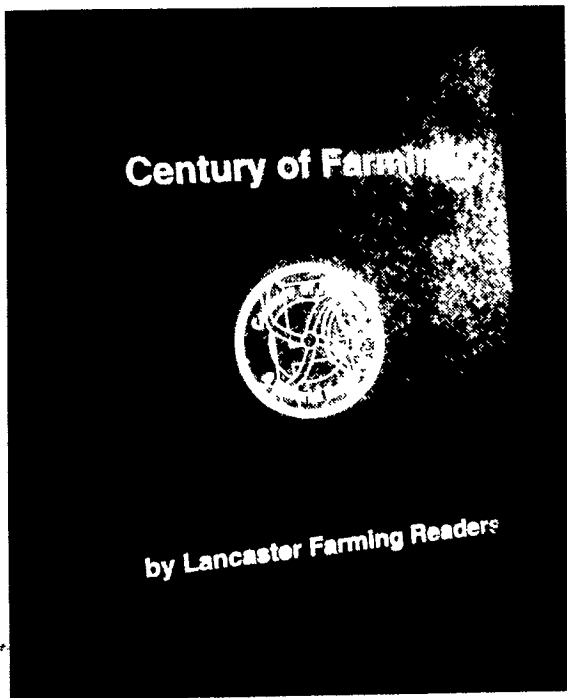
Take cues about the length of the visit. If it's too short, you may not hear of concerns or the visit may be forgotten. If it's too long, the resident may become tired.

In addition to timing of visits, it's important to limit the number of people at one time. Several people at once may increase confusion or anxiety for the resident. Furthermore, nursing home space usually is limited. Bring children to visit. Tell them what to expect and answer questions on their level of understanding.

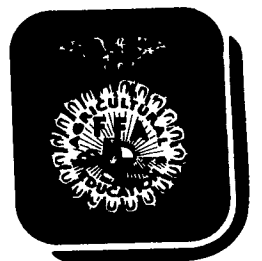
