Cheviot

Champion and reserve Cheviot were shown by Tony Haugh. This was the second year in a row that Tony won in this breed. The

champion was purchased from John Eaton, and the reserve was home bred. Tony and his dad Denny have 19 head on their Red Lion

Corriedale

Champion and reserve were shown by Morgan Schrock. The 15-year-old raises 10 homebred ewes on her grandpa's farm in Bloomsburg, Columbia County. The daughter of Roger and Janice reported that she won in her first year of competition at the state

Dorset

Champion was shown by Meredith Ruzowicz of Delaware County and the reserve by Bethany Tuhacek, Harleysville. The 17-year-old Meredith said that she had purchased the champion to add to the 25 head of Dorsets she raises. Jacob Garges, Montgomery County, showed the champion and Billy Leib, Cumberland County, the reserve.








