

ing up abandoned mines and restoring watersheds, providing funds for recreational trails, helping communities address land use, and providing new and upgraded water and sewer systems.

On Tuesday, Feb. 8, Gov. Ridge unveiled his 2000-01 budget, proposing \$135 million to fund the second year of the five year "Growing Greener" initiative. These funds will come from \$100 million in new money from the General Fund and \$35 million in funds redirected from the Recycling and Hazardous Sites Cleanup funds, and the Landfill Closure Accounts.

For 100 days-from the January Farm Show until Earth Day on April 22-Gov. Ridge and his Administration will announce at least one new "Growing Greener" initiative every week to showcase how the state's largest-ever environmental investment is benefiting Pennsylvanians.

Gov. Ridge kicked off "100 Days of Growing Greener" at the January Farm Show by announcing that he expects 100 farms to be preserved over the next 100 days, culminating on Earth Day. On Jan. 13, Lt. Gov. Schweiker was in Berks County to mark the second week of "100 Days of Growing Greener" by announcing \$5.1 million in "Growing Greener" grants for watershed protection and abandoned mine reclamation in 45 counties. On Jan. 20, Gov. Ridge marked the third week by announcing 30 grants totaling nearly \$6 million to help protect critical habitat and open space across Pennsylvania.

On Jan. 26, Gov. Ridge marked the fourth week by signing a \$210 million agreement with the USDA that will protect Pennsylvania watersheds, ensure the conservation of up to 100,000 acres of farmland, and improve wildlife habitat in the Chesapeake Bay watershed. On Feb. 4, Lt. Gov. Schweiker announced "Growing Greener" funds to help 10 communities across the state to develop community gateway gardens.

And last week, Gov. Ridge launched "Growing Smarter," which would make the largest state investment in local landuse planning; unveiled his 2000-01 budget proposal, which includes the second year of funding for "Growing Greener"; and toured the largest sportsmen show of its kind in North America to announce a new website providing one-stop access to "Growing Greener" grants and information -www.GrowingGreener.org.
