Brain Research

TOWANDA (Bradford Co.) – "What Brain Research Tells Us About Infant Care" is the topic of an upcoming workshop for child care providers. Sponsored by Penn State Cooperative Extension in Bradford County, the workshop will be held on Thursday, April 6, for 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. at the Extension Office, Bradford County Annex, 701 South Fourth Street, Towanda.

Anyone who cares for other people's children is invited to attend this free informational program. Interested parents and grandparents are also welcome to attend.

This workshop will focus on how child care providers can stimulate brain development in infants. In the past it was felt that brain development was genetically determined. However, the newer research shows that development is an

interplay between a person's genes and the experiences they have. Early experiences have been shown to have a large impact on how the brain is wired. In fact, by the age of three, children's brains are twice as active as those of adults.

Participants in the workshop will learn ways to make caring routines a valuable experience for infants, how care practices change with the age of the child, and effective ways to communicate with infants both verbally and non-verbally. The workshop will be telecast live via satellite from Penn State University throughout the U.S.

All workshop participants will receive a certificate of attendance. Licensed child care providers who attend will receive credit for two training hours
