

Before restoration, this grain thresher was found at a Juniata County auction. The early 1870's model consists of the forward threshing cylinder section and the new "winnower" back section, joined together by clamps. It demonstrates technological advancement by combining both the threshing and winnowing (grain separation) operations in one machine. Schaeffer, Merkle & Co., in Fleetwood, Berks County, made the machine. Darwin Braund, curator, bought this piece and donated it to the Pasto Agricultural Museum at Penn State University.
