For the creative presentation portion of the pageant, Diana, the 16-year-old daughter of Richard and Cindy Bigelow, presented a speech entitled "Why Drink Milk?"

Contestants were given a choice to present either a three-five minute speech or skit. Diana's speech outlined many of the nutritional reasons of choosing milk and real dairy products. Diana's delivery displayed her love and enthusiasm for the industry.

The final on-stage portion of the pageant was answering an impromptu question. Diana's question was "If you are selected as dairy princess what is one goal you wish to accomplish this year and how to go about doing so?"

Diana replied that her goal would be to reach more teenagers with the message of milk and dairy products. She stated that too many teens are making poor dietary choices and are robbing themselves of healthy futures. She continued that it would be her goal to educate teens about the nutritional value of milk over soda which has no nutritional value.

and Virginia Snare of Tyrone. Corinne's creative presentation was a speech about The Changing World of Diary. 
Carrie Russell, 5-year-old daughter of Rusty and Kristin Russell,
