Cal Ripken Jr. Continues To Pitch Milk

PHILADELPHIA (Philadelphia Co.) — Cal Ripken Jr. was the man of honor at the annual Dairy Day at Camden Yards in Baltimore. The dairy industry recognized the baseball great for his role in promoting milk to thousands of fans.

Ripken joined the American Dairy Association/Dairy Council Middle Atlantic promotion team as a spokesperson 19 years ago. Since then, he has pitched

milk to baseball fans throughout the Mid-Atlantic region through television commercials, billboards, and special events at Orioles games.

"Cal Ripken Jr. has been a superb spokesperson for the dairy industry," said Patricia Purcell, director of advertising and sales promotions for ADA/DC Middle Atlantic. "Ripken says his mother made him drink his milk when he was

a young boy. He continues to drink milk every day, and credits it for giving him strong bones and allowing him to play the sport he has loved for so long.'

During Dairy Day at Camden Yards, ADA/DC president Charles Schilling presented a framed "Cal Ripken Commemorative Poster" to Ripken on the field before a sell-out crowd. The poster, designed by artist Gary Yealdhall, was handed out to nearly 45,000 Orioles fans. It highlights Ripken's career and features milk.

Dairy Day festivities also featured Maryland State Dairy Princess Jeena Rinehart. The 17-year-old from Taneytown,

Md., opened game day by signing the National Anthem.

Recent milk production activities have centered on Ripken's 3,000th hit, which came on April 15 in a game against the Minnesota Twins. ADA/DC was ready for the occasion with television and radio ads and new outdoor billboards, in the Lancaster, York, Harrisburg and Baltimore

The billboards followed Ripken's hitting success, beginning the countdown where he ended the 1999 season at 2,991 hits. The billboards, which are viewed by more than a million people daily throughout the first half of April, were updated after every hit as Ripken neared the 3,000th mark.

Milk again captured the power behind Ripken's 3,000th hit as ADA/DC sponsored the on-field Orioles celebration of his latest achievement. The halfhour pre-game show broadcast by Home Team Sports on April 30 was brought to viewers exclusively by milk.

"The 'got milk?' logo was onscreen throughout the televised show, reminding millions of consumers of the 'real' power behind Ripken's streaks," Purcell said.

In addition to these events, ADA/DC Middle Atlantic donated 3,000 half-gallons of milk in Ripken's honor to the Franciscan Center in Baltimore to benefit the homeless, according to Purcell.

The Lebanon County Dairy Promotion Committee invites everyone to the coronation. The evening will end with the tradi-"Make Your Own tional



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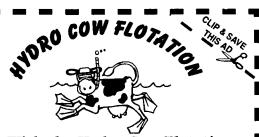


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
