Weigh-ups average to full, few gaunt. Feeder cattle in medium to fleshy conditions. Slaughter cows and bulls steady to 1.00 lower. Packers took a larger percentage of cows, but with only moderate demand. Total of 340 cows and bulls sold with 65 percent to packers.
