Kutztown Festival Makes Pennsylvania-Dutch Folklife Into Fun

The annual Kutztown "Pennsylvania-German" Festival, July 1-9, on the Kutztown Fairgrounds, is a grass roots community event. It celebrates Pennsylvania-Dutch folklife particular to the region's "plain and fancy"

KUTZTOWN (Berks Co.) — 17th and 18th century settlers, predominantly of German and Swiss ancestry. It features the quilts, fine folk art, traditional American crafts, foods, folklore, farming, and lifestyle of Pennsylvania-Dutch culture.

made quilts are displayed for sale in the Quilt Barn throughout the Festival — one of the largest quilt shows and sales of its kind in the country. On opening day 24 prize-winning quilts in the categories of pieced patch, all quilted, applique and combination designs will be auctioned at noon. The auction attracts bidders from around the U.S. and the world. "Sold" prize quilts are displayed after the sale in the Quilt Barn throughout the Festival; so, those who don't attend the auction can still see these extraordinary prize quilts. Everyone can try a hand at quilting on the Festival Quilt. Area quilters teach and conduct daily demonstrations in the Quilt Barn.

The second annual auction of limited edition folk art prior to the quilt auction will include limited editions 8 x 12-inch hand-drawn and painted fraktur in a handcrafted frame by Harry Smith. A hex sign collaboration is offered by renowned hex artist Johnny Claypoole and son, Eric. Carol Heppe's 24 inch handsewn miniature quilt, patterned after

those made by young girls in crafts, and most aspects of the earlier centuries, is in a feather painted wooden frame.

Two-hundred juried folk artists and traditional American craftsmen demonstrate and sell their works. Many wear period costumes. This is a rare occasion to see 200 of America's finest folk artists at one time.

Always fascinating are the Amish wedding, Mennonite Meeting House services and hymn sings. A historic area church presents Pennsylvania-Dutch dialect services, celebrates Harvest Home, and serves strawberries and ice cream at a Strawberry Festival next to the church building on the Festival grounds.

Folklife demonstrations like candle dipping, soap making, cow milking, antique farming, sheep shearing, dying, spinning and weaving, are a favorite with all ages. Folklife and folklore seminars are taught by university professors, teachers and local experts of Pennsylvania-Dutch dialect, herbal healing and folk medicine, Pennsylvania-Dutch spirituality, quilts, clothes and utilitarian arts and

culture.

Children's activities surround the Children's Farmyard Theatre and play area. Old fashion pony rides and Noah's Ark farm animal petting zoo, games, singalongs and hands-on activities delight the kids. Jumping in the haystack, the hay maze and old fashion games introduce many urban and suburban children to an early way of life, previously unknown to them, that continues to this day in the "plain" communities of Pennsylvania.

Pennsylvania-Dutch cooks serve homestyle Church suppers, ox roast and chicken dinners. Pennsylvania-Dutch platters and snacking foods like sausage sandwiches, Dutch fries, corn pie, funnel cake, baked goods and more.


After dinner, the curtain rises at Berks County's premier dinner theatre begins its performance of Plain and Fancy. Patrons are treated to top notch profes-
