"Therefore take no thought tor the morrow." I was taught that it meant that we should not concern ourselves with what might happen in the future.

Then, Psalms 118:8 says, "It is better to trust in the Lord than to put confidence in man." If you trust in the Lord, then you would not even consider a contract that had a biosecurity clause in it. Biosecurity is configuration of man's thinking.

There are many other scripture verses that come to mind, but I do not have the time or space to go into detail. What seems so strange to me is that many of the Mennonites, and even a few Amish, have succumbed to the pressuring of the companies that advocate biosecurity and make it a requirement of contracts. These same people belong to churches that preach about "unequal vokes in business and dealings with the outside world," yet close their eyes to their brotherhood doing just that.

I wrote to Lawrence Althouse,

who writes your scriptural article each week, asking him to include something about this sometime. I feel that it is a worse failure than the demise of farming in general, when the farmers become so conscious of monetary gains that they must resort to practices that are the opposite of what the Bible and God teaches. Trust in God above all things, and accept failure as His plan for you.
